



Spring-like weather has come early this year. The church season of Easter also comes early this year. It is fitting that spring coincides with Easter. Easter is about new life and new beginnings. We celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. This is what our faith is based upon. Without the resurrection, there would be no Christianity!

This Easter season, I invite you to look for signs of new life, to be open to the unexpected and to believe in new possibilities.

I am honoured to be with you at this time in your journey as your part-time supply minister. Jan. 3 Epiphany Sunday when everyone was invited to come forward to light a candle and to share a prayer of thanksgiving; Jan. 10 Baptism of the Lord Sunday during which all lined up to pick up a stone from the baptismal font as a reminder of their baptism;

Feb. 28 Black History service at which the "Ubuntu" troop shared their culture through dance and drumming, and Sheila Mascoll paid tribute to Mildred Franklin and Joyce Rhoden;

At our Annual meeting on Feb. 21, with a leap of faith, people voted to accept a deficit budget and committed to do their best to fundraise to make up the shortfall.

Spring is a season that stimulates hope. Streams and rivers filled with melted snow will begin to run again. Crocuses and tulips pop out of the ground. Fruit trees will be cloaked in blossoms. There is new life; it is the cycle of life! We are the people of resurrection, and as Christians, we believe that death will not be the last word, no matter what happens.

PHOEBE CLEVERLEY - WALKING WITH JESUS

(Spoken at church service Sunday, March13)

Having wanted to travel to the Middle East since I was a teenager, I was delighted to sign on with Craig Travel for their Holy Land_Pilgrimage in November of 2012. The leaders were a United Church couple, Reverend Peter Scott and his wife Rev. Heather Scott.

I was quite overwhelmed by the beauty and variety within this small country, as well as its historical and religious significant for the three great lines from Abraham; Islam, Judaism and Christianity. We began our trip by driving up the Mediterranean coast in our air-conditioned Mercedes-Benz bus to historic Caesarea and our modern hotel in nearby Netanya. We drove inland the next day, every hour exploring new wonders; Mt. Carmel, the Jezreel Valley, sometimes along the stored road to Damascus to our first view of Lake Galilee, a breathtaking visit with snow-capped Mt. Herman to the north and the dry mountains of Syria and Jordan beyond the eastern shore. Our home for four days was the Kibbutz.

Guest House of Ma'agan across the Jordan River, where we could explore the beautiful gardens and lawns leading down to a small beach. It was a bit late in the year for swimming, but I paddled in the cool, fresh water and watching birds. Israel is on a major fly-route, so birds were migrating from Europe south

to Africa and beyond. One of my favourite side-trip was sailing out of Tiberius on a boat built in the style of the time of Christ. As we shared the waves with many small fishing boats, plying their ancient trade to supply the homes and hotels with fresh fish.

One of the more remarkable sites was Tabgha, where there is a church sanctifying the miracles of the loaves and fishes, with an amazing mosaic floor. The floor pictured many birds, animals, and fish, sources of the lake, Jordan River

baptismal site, Jerusalem, Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane, view of the Old City, over a large Jewish and Muslim cemetery, the Kodrou valley, Al Ogba Mosque. Many church sites, via Delerosa, Tower of David, Garden of the Tomb, Holy Communion.

South desert and dry craggy hills, the Dead Sea, Merada, amazing palaces and fortresses, Eon Gedi – David's cave – with spring and pool, green oasis, families, sheep in green pastures and smaller brown cattle on the hills. Art by Marc Chagall in sculptures and mosaics showed joy and a closeness to Jesus that was shared with other believers (at that time a Nigerian group in colourful national dress) from all over the world. A walk with Jesus. A spiritual blessing.

THOUGHTS ON AN OBSERVER ARTICLE

Once in a while, something that I read brings clarity to my thinking. In the latest Observer, Christopher White wrote about "a narrative of death, as opposed to resurrection." However, he was not writing about Easter, but about the way that an Easter people should behave. He called on us to stop looking backwards but to serve this world as it is, and not the world of our memory.

Rev. White's article brought to my mind, some other comments that I have heard lately, at meetings, from church leaders and our own pulpit. "We are driving into the future by looking in the rear view mirror." "The sixties are over. You can bury your head in the sand and pretend that it is not true, but that won't help." "If you don't change what you are doing, you will continue to dwindle."


Pretty grim predictions, and likely to make one feel helpless. Fortunately, I have also met with real encouragement from other United Church folk. The Edge project was established to help congregations to refocus and find ways to continue our ministry into the future. In the Toronto area, one important focus is expanding use of our buildings to welcome the community, and in this way, to combine outreach with income. Several of our fellow congregations are well along with this development, and they are now both financially sound and also able to fund their ministry programs.

Our congregation has gone about as far as we can go with offering our building, because we do not have enough people to manage activities. But a recent visitor to Asbury and West offered encouragement and an idea. This was the program manager from a very successful church. Her congregation is small, but they have maximized the use of the building in their community to the point where they need a full time worker to manage it.

Our visitor recommended that we invest in a staff person for our church, but of course, I could not see any way that we could afford one! But another visit to the Edge website gave some guidance.

Edge has a group of experts who offer help in writing grant proposals. They report that only 6% of United Churches apply for grants, and in 2015, that small group received \$2.5 million between them. When we know where we want to go, then we can look for some financial help to get us started. I recommend a visit to the Edge website. www.edge-ucc.ca

At the Annual General Meeting Finance Ministry asked the Congregation to approve \$33,400.00 deficit budget. Asbury and West expect to spend \$33,400.00 more than we expect to receive in revenue. This is an extremely bad situation. This is not our first deficit budget but previously we had a financial safety net; the Building Renovation Fund. All building renovation money has now been spent or returned to general funds.

Prior to the 2016 budget, Finance Ministry could only guess at what our true costs would be because we had not been in the building for a full year. When Finance Ministry prepared the 2016 budget knowing the cost of operations for a full year, we were alarmed at the amount of the deficit. Finance informed Church Council who struck a special committee to examine each budget line item. Changes were made but the result was still a deficit. The full Church Council met to examine the budget. Once again each line item was closely reviewed but the 2016 deficit remained at \$33,400.00. Expenses for 2016 are expected to be \$19,800.00 per month. The problem is that the amount of revenue that we expect to receive is \$17,000.00 per month. We do everything that we can to reduce expenses but many are not within our ability to control. We need more revenue to cover those expenses.

58% of our total revenue comes from short and long term rentals. We are fortunate to have two long-term rent-paying tenants. Property Ministry works very hard to arrange short term rentals. This reliable income helps a lot but it is not enough.



ARE YOU ON P.A.R?

Have you thought about making your church donation by P.A.R. (Pre-Authorized Remittance)? Through PAR, automatic monthly withdrawals are made from your bank account. PAR is easy to set up and can be adjusted at any time should your circumstances change, simply speak to Cheryl Holliday, in confidence, about the process. Let's talk about donations through the collection plate. I was extremely disappointed with the results of the last Stewardship Pledge Campaign. Phoebe Cleverly, Chair of Stewardship Ministry, did her best to convince us of the need to share our "time, talents and treasure". She asked all of us to be generous! The final result of the Stewardship Pledge Campaign was a 20% drop in pledges to support local operations and a 36% drop in support for Mission and Services.

What I find truly shocking is that we only raised \$6,940.00 or 3% of total revenue through fund raising events in 2015. We need new and exciting fund raising events that will attract our neighbours. Fund raising events can be fun. These events can bring us together as a congregation. They can introduce new and old neighbours to our church building. Our Christmas concert was spectacular. About 50 performers came to entertain us. The problem was, there were about 50 people in the audience to enjoy it.

The 2015 fiscal year ended up with a surplus thanks to the generosity of Dell Park Co-operative and Michel Labbe, the President of Options for homes. Their gift of \$275,000.00 helped us finish the renovations and pay down our debts. This donation gives us a chance to gain control of our Church Family finances but time is short and the need to act is urgent. We cannot expect another windfall in 2016. It is up to us now. This church has served the Bathurst and Lawrence community for 204 years. Are we going to be the first generation in all that time who fails to keep the Asbury and West United Church doors open?



IRENE TUCK - WALKING WITH JESUS

(Spoken at church service Sunday, March 13)

This was a trip of a lifetime. Being in the land where Jesus walked, visiting the places where he lived and preached, sharing these moments with my friends from this church, my husband Lee and son David – it was incredible.

Thanks to Doug McKenzie, our minister at the time and our leader, and to our tour guide, we were able to visit some beautiful and historical places. Ones that stick out in my mind are the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus prayed, the tree believed to be the one that Zacchaeus sat in while waiting for Jesus to pass by, and the mountain where Jesus preached to the multitude. I remember placing a prayer in a crack of the Western Wall, and taking a sample of water from the Jordan River for my granddaughter's baptism.

A funny incident took place in Jerusalem. A car had parked in the bus parking spot. No problem. Doug, Scott, Peter and another Doug just picked up one end of the car and moved it out of the way. I think there is a picture in the photo album we brought today.

One might think it would be dangerous going to Israel due to all the unrest. But our tour guide was

kept informed about any trouble. We always felt perfectly safe. The only time we experienced a change in our plans was when we tried to visit Bethlehem. A soldier standing guard near the entrance to the Bethlehem office of the Israeli Interior Ministry had been shot and killed. This was near site of the Church of the Nativity, built over the cave where Jesus is said to have been born. We went back to Bethlehem the next day and visited this church.

Most of the time we stayed in hotels but we also had the opportunity to stay in a kibbutz or an agricultural community. It was quite rugged, very down to earth, yet an enjoyable part of the whole tour experience. Other highlights were our visits to the many beautiful synagogues, temples and mosques, as well as to numerous biblical sites and archeological digs.

All in all, this trip was an amazing life experience that touched my heart and soul. I can truly say that "I walked today where Jesus walked, and felt Him close to me."



THAT ALL MAY BE ONE (JOHN 17:21)

In 1965, shortly after Zambia's independence, three church/mission societies came together to form the United Church of Zambia. United Church of Canada personnel were present and the UCC has enjoyed and nurtured a partnership with the UCZ since that time. For its 50th anniversery celebration (in January) the UCZ organized a Sunday morning public worship service in the Nkana soccer stadium (Kitwe) with the President of the Republic as guest of honour (H.E. Mr E.C. Lungu). Also in attendance was an adherent of the Asbury and West congregation. I spent 18 years working, as an agriculturalist, in Zambia, and from '94 – 2004 was the UCC Africa Secretary responsible for partner relations in East and Central Africa. (The UCC was invited, but the Moderator, General Secretary and Africa Secretary were unable to go.)

In my comments (speech) to the thousands present, I made reference to notable UCC personalities who worked with the UCZ but also to the significant assistance provided by UCZ clergy to our work in Canada through Mutuality in Mission, Face to Face and Partner in Residence programmes. In addition, the current General Secretary of The UCZ, Rev Dr Peggy Mulambya Kabonde is the partner representative at all UCC General Council Executive meetings.

After the ceremony I was privileged to visit the original UCZ theological college which has now become a university and to learn more of the growth and programmes of the UCZ throughout the country.









DAVID TUCK - WALKING WITH JESUS

(Spoken at church service Sunday, March 13)

Rev. Douglas McKenzie announced to the congregation that he would like to take a group of people to Israel. He called it "Follow the Footsteps of Jesus". Thirty-three people signed up and in March 1988 we landed in Tel Aviv. What an amazing experience it was! It was a privilege to visit the many places where Jesus walked. You will recognize some of the familiar names.

They include Ashdod Ashkelon (Herod's birthplace), Beer Sheva (Abraham's Well), Jaffa (Simon the Tanner's house), Caesarea (Herod's Amphitheatre and the Roman Hippodrome), Haifa (Stella Maris Monastery on Mt. Carmel) and Megiddo (Canaanite Temple at Mt. Tabor), Nazareth (Jesus' childhood home) and the Basilica of the Annunciation, the synagogue where he preached, and Mary's Well. Highlights included Tiberias where we sailed on the Sea of Galilee and saw a boat at the bottom of the sea believed to be one of the fishermen's boats. I went swimming here. The Mount of the Beatitudes; Jordan River – After walking down the path where people entered to be baptized by John the Baptist, Doug baptized me; Capernaum – entered through the gate of the White Synagogue aka The Synagogue of Jesus; visited Mount Hermon; Metulla – the Golan Heights; Beth Alpha and Tabgha – Doug served us communion at the Church of the Multiplication (site of the miracle of the seven loaves and fishes); Beth She'an –location of the Roman Amphitheatre; Jericho– excavation site of the wall of Jericho, the Inn of the Good Samaritan, and the sycamore tree believed to be the one that Zacchaeus climbed; Wadi Qelt – the Greek Orthodox Monastery; Masada – the Northern Palace aka Herod's Palace.

Other points of interest were Qumran Valley (the Dead Sea Scrolls were found here), Dead Sea (I floated in the sea – held up by the salt), Jerusalem (Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane and the tomb where Jesus was laid to rest), The Western Wailing Wall, Dome of the Rock (Muslin shrine and location of Foundation Rock believed to be where Abraham prepared to sacrifice

Isaac), and Mount Moriah (Isaac lies under Abraham's knife and a threshing floor that bore David's altar and later Solomon's Temple).

We visited the Upper Room at Mount Zion. King David's tomb is under the Upper Room. When I touched the banner where David lies I felt a spiritual sensation. We went into the Upper Room and to the Pater Noster Chapel where it is thought that Jesus taught his disciple's the Lord's Prayer.

The Golden Gate is significant – in the Jewish faith this gate will remain sealed until the Messiah returns to open it. At Bethlehem we went to the Church of the Nativity and the spot where it is believed Jesus was born. I lit a candle there and Doug read the Christmas story.

On the way to Jerusalem we stopped at the place where the Parable of the Mustard Seed was told and the mountain where Jesus preached to the 5000. No matter where you stood, people would have been able to hear Jesus preach.

On our return from Jerusalem we went through the Lion's Gate where Jesus started carrying his cross (aka the Via Delorosa) and stopped at the 6 stations. We then went to the Holy Sepulchre Altar and the Chapel of the Crucifixion.

I collected many mementos from my trip – a menorah; a pot made from the clay where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found (also holds a piece of the scroll); a wooden cup and a large olive wood Last Supper carving from Jerusalem; a necklace from Nazareth bearing my name written in Hebrew.

We all received an Attestation of Pilgrimage certificate that says – "By this attestation be it known that David Tuck by virtue of fulfilling the Biblical injunction has ascended to Jerusalem, the Holy City, Capital of Israel and is henceforth authorized to bear the title of – "Jerusalem Pilgrim".



GETTING TO KNOW YOU - MY CONVERSATION WITH VERNON

On Sunday, February 28 our church had a wonderful celebration of Black History month, with gospel songs, personal stories, a lively and engaging drum and dance performance by the children and young people of the UBUNTO group, special prayers and Rev. Irene Ty's sermon, "Celebrating the Journey". The service was followed by a delicious buffet, Caribbean style. The planning team included Vernon Hendrickson, Janiss Johnson, Sheila Mascoll, Lola Pinnock, Lou and Joyce Rhoden. Lola, a soprano in our choir, produced her big, deep gospel voice to sing "Previous Lord, Take My Hand". Many thanks to Paulo, our Music Director and the team for bringing us such an uplifting message to freedom and loving care.

I thought you would enjoy hearing a little more of Vernon Hendrickson's own personally journey, especially as he received a Community Appreciation Award for community service, in honour of black History Month, on February 22nd from MACCA. Quiz question...What is MACCA? Answer: Markham African Caribbean Canadian Association.

Vernon was born in Nevin, Leeward Island, and part of the British West Indies in the beautiful Caribbean Sea. His parents were conservative, his Mother a staunch Methodist. He attended a private elementary school located on the first floor of her church, during the week. He graduated from the local secondary school and took a job with the Department of Agriculture, growing yams, potatoes, peas, onions, cassava, etc. His parents believe that the abundant harvest should be shared and Vernon was able to help others through his gardening skills. As on many of the islands, there were extensive sugar cane fields where labour was hard, underpaid, with little relief from the hot sun. The sugar from these estates was shipped to England to be refined.

Vernon and his wife, Shirley, a teacher born the neighbouring island of St. Kitts, were married while quiet young. The family immigrated to Canada and Vernon, keen to continue his education, enrolled at York University, where he studied Political Science and graduated with an Honours BA. He wasn't hired as a teacher, but took a job with Sun Newspapers and became a supervisor in their circulation department.

I commended that many black people who came to Canada for better opportunities have been hugely successful in the arts, especially music, law and politics, in medicine and even in law enforcement. I asked about violent treatment by police, especially of young black men, and sometimes their lack of respect toward black women. He agreed that prejudice and discrimination still exists in our society. An apartment may be "already rented", or a job "filled", based on a person's colour or accent. His son, returning from work late at night in the family car, was stopped by police. He was able to show his licence and papers, and the officers backed off.

Vernon says he gets along with everyone and enjoys a full life with a broad range of interest and friends. He has been a soccer player and is a good swimmer. He is now an insurance broker, a supporter of the Liberal Party and his local MP, and is an enthusiastic community volunteer. He reads widely and mentioned Robin Hood and his merry men as boyhood heroes.

Asked about the problem of absent fathers, he agreed it is very sad for children to grow up with no father as a role model. It's a big challenge for their mothers also and these families need support from their community and the opportunity to engage in sports or games such as chess, taking part in a choir, or learning to play steel drums. Programs to help steer young people away from excessive drinking, drugs, and gang violence, to encourage them to stay in school, to get an education, in order to achieve a place in society, are of primary importance. This is especially true in an area such as Jane and Finch. Vernon has taken donated books to a community centre in a Catholic school near there and mentioned a barber shop near Jane & Wilson as a place to meet people from the black community.

The Christian churches can help by bringing the message of God's love for all of his/her people. Jesus reached out to me and women at every level of society and from every cultural background, with a special welcome for children. Canada and southwester Ontario in particular, played a major role as the destination for black people fleeing slavery via the Underground Railroad in the 19th century. We have been greatly enriched by the contributions of those who came from the American South, and more recently from the Caribbean. Vernon agrees that we still have a way to go before reaching equal opportunity and acceptance for all our citizens.

God calls us to walk with each other, to share His love and to shine brightly in His beautiful world He has given us.

First let me say that I really do not like flying and I don't do heights.

When the late Rev. Doug announced that he would be leading a group to the Holy Land and whoever wanted to go could speak to him, I prayed about it. I knew I wanted to go but there was some unrest in Israel at that time and those of you who know me know that I am not bold. I received an answer to my pray, 'Go, you will be safe'.

On a Sunday afternoon in of 1988 a group of members and friends of Asbury and West flew to Israel, stopping in Denmark first.


I remember when we arrived at Ben Gurion Airport I was excited, anxious, and happy. We were then taken to Tel Aviv where we spent the night. I cannot remember in order the places we visited but I remember that each morning before we would go to a site, Doug or a member of our group would read the portion of scripture where we would be going.

I remember going to Ashkelon where we visited a park and Doug's son climbed a Carob tree. We were then introduced to the crown of thorns. It was at that time that I really felt moved. Tears came to my eyes as the reality of the story was before my eyes. I knew that the Bible told us all these things but seeing is something. We saw St Peter's house and the sea of Jaffa where Jonah sailed from. We went to Beersheba and met some Israeli girls in training for the army. They were very friendly and allowed us to take pictures with them. They spoke Hebrew but their smiles welcomed us.

There were places that brought real emotions to my life. Going across the Sea of Galilee from Tiberius to Capernaum. As we got off the boat we saw an old Synagogue where it is said Jesus taught. We visited the Mount where Jesus spoke the words of the Beatitudes and where Jesus fed the five thousand. Doug gave us communion there; he took a small roll and broke it and gave it to us.

Other places interest were, the Jordon River where Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist. I remember the long walk through the Via Dolorosa. I imagined Jesus stumbling along there with the cross on his back. This was very spiritual for me. We went to a synagogue service where women were not allowed to sit with the men. The women sat upstairs and men sat downstairs. We also visited a Mosque which we had to remove our shoes as they were praying and kissing the ground. We went to Church at the Garden Tomb; this was another emotional moment for me. The Mount of the Transfiguration, the Jerica road to the Dead Sea, the dip in the Dead Sea where the water was different. You did not have to swim as it kept you afloat. Such an experience.

When I was a little girl in Sunday School, I was sure these places were above the skies. After walking where Jesus walked, seeing his birthplace, the place of his crucifixion, the whole experience felt to me like I was walking through the Bible. I felt closer to Jesus and I felt like a whole person. I came back with feelings of joy. I was so blessed to be on that trip. Ever since that trip I think that I am a better person from that experience. It is real. Jesus is real.

All of these building users are both outreach and a source of income for our congregation.



The Resurrection


