
I came across this poem by Helen Steiner Rice in my library at home and though I would share it with you:

JOHN McDERMOTT Teror

John McDermott is a well known Scottish Canadian tenor best known for his rendering of the songs 'Danny Boy' and 'Loch Lomond'. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, John moved to Canada with his family in 1965 and settled in Willowdale. John has toured all over Canada, United States, Australia, New Zealand and Europe.

A current project close to John's heart is to raise 3.6 million dollars to enhance and expand the palliative care unit of K wing Veterans Centre at Sunnybrook Hospital.

In 2010 John was awarded a minister of Veterans Affairs Commendation for his work on behalf of veterans. He is also an honorary member of the War Amps of Canada.

John played his first U.S. concert in 1995 at Boston's Ritz Carlton Hotel and a member of the audience went backstage to pay his respects. It was Senator Edward Kennedy and the American icon invited John to perform at the Democratic National Convention in 1996. They became friends and John, at Ted's request, frequently visited the Kennedy Compound at Cape Cod. When the Massachusetts senator died in August 2009, John was invited to sing at the memorial service.

Keep November 18 at 2pm open for this wonderful event. We will need lots of help from everyone in the church to make this a success and to make our church a focal point in this community.

Spring gives us beautiful flowers, blooming trees, green grass and lest not forget rain and flooding. Here, at Asbury we were faced with flooding of one of the classrooms of the Forest Hill Montessori Daycare two weeks ago. Unfortunately this flooding was not from rain but from one of the pipes in the ceiling. It would appear when installation was done during the renovation this pipe was not properly joined. Over time it was slowly leaking into the installation of a corner of the wall and finally it came apart flooding the classroom. This occurred on the Western side of the building (to the back), the last classroom of the school. The children were evacuated and used our Upper Room. A plumber was called and immediate repairs were done to stop the leak. Extensive damage to wall resulted in a whole section of the wall needing to be redone. Our insurance company was contacted and the





Adjuster came to access the damage. Similarly, Forest Hill Montessori Daycare called their insurance provider for assessment. Your PROPERTY MINISTRY was present for the assessment, pictures were taken (see below) and a decision was made to engage the Forest Hill Montessori's company for the necessary work as they had the more economical estimate of \$5,000. Our expenses will include our insurance deductible of \$1,000.00 and the cost for the plumber.

Relations with our other tenant, Immanuel Methodist Korean Church are going well.

Maintenance work by Cool-Aid Mechanical has taken place on the HVAC. However we are still experiencing some leaks from one of the boilers which they will be coming back to check on.

The month of March was busy with some short term rentals and we also have bookings up to June. Please let us know if you are available to supervise any of these bookings.






