





WE WILL REMEMBER.... VIMY RIDGE DAY **April 9-12, 1917**

Canada's most impressive tribute overseas to those Canadians who fought and gave their lives in the First World War is the majestic and inspiring Canadian National Vimy Memorial. It overlooks the Douai Plain from the highest point of Vimy Ridge, about ten kilometres north of Arras.

The Memorial does more than mark the site of the engagement that Canadians were to remember with more pride than any other operation of the First World War. It stands as a tribute to all who served their country in battle in that four-year struggle and particularly to those who gave their lives.

France granted Canada 107 hectares of land at Vimy, and sculptor Walter Seymour Allward was chosen to design the memorial. Work began in 1925 and was completed 11 years later.

PROPERTY MINISTRY

The Property committee along with our devoted custodian Alvaro continues keeping up on whatever maintenance needs to be done. With this year's dreadful winter, having snow removal contracted out was well worth it.

As we are now in the 5th year since the renovation of the church, some equipment is failing resulting in having to be repaired or replaced. Quotes from our maintenance agents have come in which we are reviewing as we keep in mind costs to the congregation.

For those using the south entrance to the church, you will notice that the entrance key pad is not in operation. Not only did the winter months cause damage to it but the battery failed. We are in the process of having it repaired as well as thinking of ways that it can be protected from the cold. This has been a source of inconvenience to the daycare as well.

You may have noticed that the church banner on the fence has been taken down as it was in a state of dis-repair from the constant wind over the winter. We are presently having a "Feather Flag" made showing the church's address and time of service pending the approval from the city for a larger permanent sign. We have applied to the Transportation Department as well as Community Council to seek their approval. We have also contacted the councillor for the area whose involvement will be necessary.

During the months of July-August we will welcome a Cooking Day Camp – Rooks to Cooks in the Upper Room for kids 6 years and over. Not only will this help with our revenue, but also to showcase the church's community effort.

How Is The Date Of Easter Determined Each Year?

Based on mathematical calculations, Easter falls on the first Sunday after the Full Moon date on or after March 21. If the Full Moon is on a Sunday, Easter is celebrated on the following Sunday.

Although Easter is liturgically related to the beginning of spring in the Northern Hemisphere (March equinox) and the Full Moon, its date is not based on the actual astronomical date of either event.

March 21 is the church's date of the March equinox, regardless of the time zone, while the actual date of the equinox varies between March 19 and March 22, again depending on the time zone.

The date of the *Paschal Full Moon*, used to determine the date of Easter, is based on mathematical approximations following a 19-year cycle called the *Metonic cycle*.

Both dates *may* coincide with the dates of the astronomical events, but in some years, they don't.

COUNCIL

The Annual General Meeting for the church was held on Sunday February 24th and several exciting and important items took place. Here are the highlights:

Melvyne Beckles was nominated to be a Trustee. As you may know, the Trustees are responsible for and oversee such things as our church building, insurance policies, investments, tenant leases.

Linda Cobon was nominated as our Shining Waters Regional 10 Council Representative. This new name replaces Presbytery Representative and reflects the new structure of the United Church that came into effect January 1st this year.

We are indeed grateful to Melvyne and Linda for accepting their new roles and responsibilities. Please join me in thanking them for their dedication and service to our church.

A survey was distributed regarding Flock Talk and The Observer with an eye on our financial budgets. The wishes of the majority of respondents has lead us to the following decisions:

Effective immediately, Flock Talk will be published three times per year and available on Easter Sunday, Thanksgiving Sunday and Christmas Sunday. The June Father's Day Sunday issue is cancelled. If you wish to make a donation to pay for an issue or help defray the cost, please speak to the editors.

The Observer (recently renamed Broadview) magazine subscription will become the responsibility of each individual household. Since the annual subscription for this year has been finalized, the switch over will take place next year and details for a smooth transition will be forthcoming.

Oversees all matters related to the programs and special occasion for the United Church Women (UCW) and Joybreak and encourages all women to participate.

WORSHIP, SACRAMENTS AND MUSIC (Chair: Sylvia Shewalter-Nielsen)

Oversees all aspects of worship. Assists the Minister on planning worship services and coordinates the preparation and decoration of the sanctuary for services. Prepares for and assists with the elements of Baptism and Communion. Takes attendance at services, ushers and gathers the offering.

THE EASTER LILY

Tradition states that the Easter lily originated in the Garden of Eden by the teardrops of Eve that she spread while leaving the Garden of Eden. They were teardrops of repentance. The Easter lily also has its roots in pagan rituals - specifically, Hera, the queen of motherhood.

Lilium longiflorum is also known as the Easter lily because in Christianity, it is a symbol of the resurrection of Christ, which is celebrated during Eastertide. The lily has always been highly regarded in the Church, as Jesus Himself referenced the flower, saying "Consider the lilies how they grow: they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these" (Luke 12:27). Moreover, according to pious legend, "after Jesus' death and resurrection, some of these beautiful flowers were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus went to pray the night before His crucifixion." Legend has it that these flowers sprung up where drops of Jesus' sweat fell as he prayed. In many Christian churches, the chancel is adorned with Easter lilies throughout the Paschal season.

- The first story of a rabbit (later named the "Easter Bunny") hiding eggs in a garden was published in 1680.

- The traditional act of painting eggs is called Pysanka.




