

## A SPECIAL GUEST VISITS THE UCW

At our May meeting the UCW invited Nancy Raymont (the wife of Rev. Bob Raymont) to speak with us about the format of some of the women's group in which she has been a participant. We were very honoured to have Nancy with us. She spoke about three different groups which use the bible and prayer as their focus. Here are the highlights:

**1. Lectio Divinia...** The term means "Divine Reading and describes a way of reading the scripture whereby we gradually let go of our own agenda and open ourselves to what God wants to say to us. This group has leaders who select the scripture for each meeting. There are other elements to the meetings process such as meditation, a dialogue with God based on the scriptures. This leads into the contemplative state - quiet resting in God. As our relationship with God deepens members are expected to take what they have learnt and express it in their everyday life.

**2. Walking in the Word...** This group meets outside in a park. They start by slowly reading a passage of scripture. The passage is read three times and then members go for a 15-30 minute walk. Each person walks in silence observing their natural surroundings and relating it to God's word. The scripture is reread halfway through the walk to refresh the mind. At the end the group gathers in the park for a personal sharing and prayer.

**3. Stephen Ministry...** This is a Christ centered one-to-one free and confidential caring ministry for church members. It trains members in a 50 hour study programme.

Our group enjoyed Nancy's presentation and looks forward to investigating ways to enrich our future group meetings.

## SENIORS' TRIP TO NIAGARA FALLS

Are we aware of what a spectacular natural phenomenon we have on Ontario, just a couple of hours along the Queen Elizabeth Way to Niagara Falls? People come from all over the world to experience this remarkably reliable attraction. I visited the site as a child with my parents and as a parent with my children. I took my daughter-in-law's English mother to see the famous falls, its powerful flow, its voluminous mists, the whirlpool a little way down the river along the scenic Niagara Parkway; to wander through the colourful Botanical Gardens and have lunch by the Queenston Heights memorial to Major-General Sir Isaac Brock\*. It is quite possible, and my personal preference, to ignore most of the 'tourist traps', especially the casino.

One experience I've always wanted to have is the ride 'under the Falls' on the Maid of the Mist. These boats (Maid of the Mist VI and VII) now sail out of the dock on the American side of the river. On the Canadian side, "The Voyage to the Falls Boat Tour" is now offered aboard a modern ship, The 'Hornblower". When our Young at Heart seniors travelled by comfortable bus trip to the Falls on May 21st, I signed up for the boat trip and I loved it -- the close-up view of the

American, Bridal Veil and Horseshoe Falls, the steep sides of the gorge, rocky and wooded, the hundreds of birds, (mostly gulls) who live there, the waves and the drenching mists -- enjoyed it all!

Many thanks to Shirley and Mel who are dedicated and inspired long-term leaders of this group. They arranged a bountiful delicious buffet lunch at the Rainbow Cafe overlooking the Falls, and drinks and snacks aboard the bus.

The definition of 'senior' by the way, is extremely flexible. Although we're all young at heart we are indeed considerably older than when this group was first formed.

## CONFERENCE AND PRESBYTERY

The 89<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of Toronto Conference just happened. The theme for the weekend was "Finding God in Unexpected Places". Our theme speaker for the weekend was the moderator Gary Patterson. Gary encouraged all of us to look at re-engaging our community in new and different ways. Several workshops were held that encouraged us to find new ways of expressing our faith in God. We also looked at a proposed restructuring plan for our United Church of Canada that will be voted on at next year's General Council meeting in Cornerbrook. At the conference, two women and one man was ordained and a minister from Presbyterian Church in Canada transferred his membership into the United Church of Canada. We installed the Rev. Brian Ransum to a two year term as president of Toronto Conference and elected 24 commissioners to go to next year's General Council.

In terms of presbytery, we are still busy trying to help congregations complete effective leadership and the anti bullying and anti harassment work. Presbytery has had some staff changes. Deanna Wilson has been filling in as Personnel Minister for the past two years. Dale Hildebrand will be taking over these duties in August. A minister for Intercultural Ministry has been hired to work with people from other cultures to find homes within the United Church of Canada. Dale Burkhart has finished his term as Chair of Presbytery. Catherine Smith and Henry McLeod will become co-chairs of our presbytery at our meeting in Norval on June 17.

## YOUNG AT HEART TRIP TRIGGERS HISTORICAL ANSWER

On May 21 the Young at Heart Seniors group took a trip to Niagara Falls\* and at Queenston Heights we passed by a tall column overlooking the Niagara River valley, although we didn't stop. The question was asked: "Is Brock buried at the Monument?" No one knew for sure, so I undertook to find out. This was easy, as I'm reading James Laxer's book: "Tecumseh and Brock, The War of 1812".

Major General Isaac Brock, Commander of the British forces in Upper Canada, was killed in the battle of Queenston Heights on October 13, 1812. He was buried three days later at Fort George, near what is now Niagara-on-the-Lake, with full military honours. The funeral procession was attended by British soldiers, Canadian militiamen, and native warriors. In three salvos, the British fired a twenty-one gun salute, echoed by the American garrison across the river at Fort Niagara, with our own salute out of respect for the fallen general. Astonishingly, more than five thousand people managed to be present for the funeral. The news that a knighthood had been bestowed upon him (in recognition of his bold leadership in the capture of Detroit) arrived a few days later so he was unaware that he would be known in history as Sir Isaac Brock, Canadian hero of the War of 1812.

## HELPFUL HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To sharpen scissors, simply cut through sandpaper.




Use a Post-It note when drilling to catch the dust.

## BUILDING RENOVATION COMMITTEE



It won't be long now! If you have visited 3180 Bathurst Street or driven by lately you can see that the building is almost ready.

What on earth is taking so long? The architect and mechanical/electrical engineers want to be sure that each piece of equipment in the building is operating perfectly before we move in. This includes the new elevator and wheel-chair lift, the air conditioning system and four furnaces, the sprinkler and alarm systems, and all the complex plumbing and electrical systems. The new state-of-the-art fire control panel has already passed inspection. That is a huge step toward occupancy.

There is always a list of small items such as paint touch-ups, a missing ceiling tile or a crack in the cement. These are called "deficiencies". Kembic Construction is working hard to correct any deficiencies before we move in. The deficiency list is not holding us up. When the building systems pass inspections we will call the movers.

We have a confirmed tenant and a possible tenant. Forest Hill Montessori are as anxious as we are to move into their beautiful new daycare space. Redeemer Baptist congregation are discussing their

plans and a final decision will be made soon. We enjoyed our time with Redeemer Baptists and wish them well no matter what they decide.

In a little while we will have forgotten all the difficulties and delays that we have encountered. The church building that we are moving into is a lot different than the one we left and we have many wonderful memories. From the comments that we have received, our neighbours can't wait until we are back in operations.

It is the sincere wish of the entire Building Renovation Committee that the renovated building will not only be a gathering and scattering place for our own congregation but a hub of community activity for many years to come. We hope that new members and adherents of Asbury and West United Church will love our new church home and we wish them many happy times and new and wonderful memories.

# FINANCE MINISTRY

## Church Operations Finances

Our revenue was \$51,320.00 but our expenses for programs, payroll and general administration equalled \$55,837.78. While we are doing everything possible to control costs, we have a shortfall of \$4,553.79 up to the end of April.

## Building Renovation Finances

The Asbury and West United Church Building Renovation project is almost complete but with unanticipated expenses thereby creating a shortfall. As previously mentioned, the fact that we are tenants and not landlords has resulted in cash flow shortages.

## The Good News

We do have assets such as the Manse Fund, GICs covering segregated funds and a valuable building. Church Council authorized and South-West Presbytery gave special permission for me to borrow up to \$175,000.00 from the Manse Fund to see us through this challenging financial times. We are grateful to be able to borrow the money we need.

Additionally, we have some money to come to us in the future; an HST rebate in the Fall 2014, a further HST rebate around March 2015, and a \$57,000 bond to be returned in 2016 by the City

of Toronto. The bond was required to guarantee that our landscaping will grow.

It is worth repeating that our time as a congregation renting space is soon over and Forest Hill Montessori School will soon become our tenant.

The members of the Property Ministry are investigating rental opportunities.

The members of the Stewardship Ministry are diligently exploring avenues for fundraising.

Many members of our congregation donate to the church through the Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR) program. We appreciate your help with those monthly bills even when you cannot attend church.

We are blessed at Asbury and West with the members of our congregation who continue their faithful support.

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As you can see the list of good news items is long. Thank you for your continuing financial contributions and support.


