I am looking forward to when we return to in-person worship. The Council of Asbury and West has set a target date of November 28^{th} . This date is the first Sunday of Advent.








Indigenous Recognition



Sunday June 27, 2021, was identified as Canada Day Sunday and Indigenous Sunday. We were filled with sadness at the recent news of the 215 dear children found in Kamloops and the 751 unmarked graves found in Saskatchewan. We recognized the unspeakable pain the Indigenous community continues to suffer.

As part of our service, two poems were read from the book titled LIVING <u>IN THE</u> TALL GRASS, Poems of Reconciliation by Chief R. Stacey Laforme. Chief Laforme was elected Chief of the Mississaugas of the Anishinaabe in December of 2015. In October 2017, Chief Laforme became only the third Honorary Senior Fellow of Massey College in Toronto, joining The Duke of Edinburgh and the Chancellor of Oxford University in the rarest honour the college bestows.

In one paragraph of the prologue to his book, Chief Laforme writes, "I write with the intent to place myself in the heart and soul of different individuals at different stages of their lives. If you can see yourself in the poems, then my intent was a success."

PRAYER FOR THE STUDENTS OF KAMLOOPS RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL

O God, we are grieving. O God, we are shocked. O God, we are horrified. But, God, if we truly listened, we can't be surprised. The Elders and the Communities had already told the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, told the governments and the world, the stories of the children, dead and buried, unnoted by the settler systems, but never ever forgotten by their siblings, their parents, their communities.

We grieve for the Indigenous children, taken from their homes and parents by the government, handed over to the responsibility of the Christian church, the children who died under its care, never to be held by their families, never to be returned to their communities — not only the 215 children of the Tk'emlups te Secwepemc and other Indigenous communities along the west coast and interior whose bodies have now been found on the grounds of the Kamloops Indian Residential School grounds, but all of those children whose bodies have not yet been found who died in any of Indian Residential Schools.

We grieve for the survivors of the Indian Residential Schools, the children who did come home, but were changed by their experience, the children who grew up, and have the trauma of remembering, again, what happened to them.

Even as we give thanks for their families and communities, who hold the stories of the children, who have kept searching, who keep searching, we grieve that that search is even necessary, that even one child was taken, that even one child died, that even one child's death went unnoted by the system.

Help us to stop, to sit in silence, to remember the names we do not know. May their spirits have peace, and their bodies be brought home to their lands.

And God? Help us to take this grief, this shock, this horror, and turn it into right action — action that works for right relations— action that works for healing and justice and hope.

And, please, don't let those of us who are settlers and descendants of settlers, newcomers to this land, let the horror, the shock, and the grief just be an outpouring of words, or tears, or ineffectual hand-wringing.

Let this be a moment that changes, a moment that transforms the brokenness, that we might walk in right relations, for the good of your children, for the good of your world.

Please, God. These things we pray, in the name of the one who brought Creation into being, in the name of Jesus, our teacher and friend, in the name of the Holy Spirit, whose wings spread across the sky.

I would like to thank Rev. Carol McKinley for inviting me to become Chair of Council and to the members for their welcome.







When We Zoom There's Lots Of Room.....

...to meet our neighbours. Over the past several months we have been invited to join Zoom church services with our neighbours at Fairbank United Church located on the west side of Dufferin between Eglinton and Lawrence. The history of Fairbank United Church runs parallel to that of Asbury and West; roots dating back to 1844, circuit rider Methodist ministers traveling on horseback, the church built on farmland, a corner stone dated 1889, the city growing around the church property, joining the United Church in 1925 and long-standing faithful members.

Pastor Steven Loweth, who completed the DLM degree through St. Andreew's College in Saskatoon, is the minister and leads the congregation as they journey together in faith, love, grace and community. (Pastor Steven has also been available for Asbury's pastoral calls when our Rev Carol is away.) Similar to Asbury, the membership could be referred to as small but the commitment of the faithful, dedicated members is large. Their mission statement reveals the focus of their ministry: "To be a people of God serving Christ in this community, welcoming all peoples for worship, fellowship and caring support."

Our relationship with Fairbank United Church is long standing. For those who may remember, years ago Asbury had an *Annual Spring Sing* organized by the then Minister of Music, William (Bill) Shewalter. Choir members from seven (7) neighbouring churches participated and the Fairbank choir members always shared their talent and love of music.


