

THE PASTOR'S PEN

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven.

(NRSV Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Summer has gone and with the passing of summer, our first year "in exile" has passed. Now it is not a bad exile. We aren't facing hunger, or oppression, or violence here. We are living with friends. Oh sure sometimes the path between our two congregations has not been completely easy. But for the most part, we have been able to get along. But even though it has been fairly pleasant, this year has been a time away. We have been away from our church home. We have missed people who couldn't quite make the journey up here. We have had to change and give up traditions in working with our Northminster partners. This change is never easy. Yes there have been good times. Yes we have gone through big celebrations here like our 200th anniversary. We marked occasions like Mel and Shirley's 50th wedding anniversary. During our time here we have had a baptism. But also there have been hard times. We have said good bye to many good friends through funerals. We have had to deal with delays and budget problems with our project. We have shed some tears. All this has happened in one year.

I am not sure if any of you have ever felt exiled. Sometimes it can be a self imposed exile that gets us thinking about how things have changed. After years of working in Toronto, I had the occasion to go back to Vancouver in 2007. Vancouver is a city that I had lived in for 15 years before coming to Toronto in 2000. In some ways, the city had not changed. Stanley Park, the North Shore Mountains, the Lion's Gate Bridge, Pacific Centre Mall and the Downtown Eastside were all still there.

But even though many things had stayed the same, my impressions of Vancouver had changed in the 7 years since I had lived there. Vancouver seemed small compared to Toronto. Traffic problems were different. The beautiful mountains separated me from home. And Vancouver had changed- it had evolved in new ways since I had left.

Maybe that is something for us to think about in this year when we hope to be moving back to 3180 Bathurst Street. In one way it will be wonderful to get back. Back under our own roof. Our committees will establish a way that they need to operate. We won't have to share offices, or bulletins, or kitchens etc. Won't it be great.

But it won't be exactly the same. We will have changed in our year away. We will have learned new ways of doing things, some of these which we might want to adapt when we get home. And our neighbourhood will have changed in the time when we have been away. Certainly we will have new neighbours from the condo next door, but I am sure our neighbourhood will continue to have evolved during our exile.

Certainly the bible can relate to stories like that. We know how the best and brightest were taken to Babylon during the captivity. Then it was time for them to come home. I am sure most were excited to go back home. But things had changed. The captives had learned much during their time in Babylon. The Babylonian culture, for good and bad, had become part of the Jewish culture. And when the captives got back home, they realized that Jerusalem had not stood still. It had evolved as well. It took some time for all of these differences to be worked out.

So I wish us well, as we go through this last year before we get home. The road will not always be easy, but together and with God's help we will survive. Blessings.

"The problem with our church is that they are always asking for money." How many times have you heart that, or thought it yourself? The truth is: our church lives in a material world and there are bills to pay. Our building renovation plans are coming along and we are looking forward to returning to 3180 Bathurst at the earliest possible moment. However, we still need to pay the bills. We must pay our fair share of the upkeep of Northminster United Church while we are here, but we no longer have rental income from our tenants. Please pledge what you can to help the Finance Committee balance the budget in 2013.

Our annual Pledge Campaign will start Sunday November 4th. We will be asking you to help us by contributing on a regular basis. The traditional donation envelopes are available or you may prefer to give what you can when you can. The best way to provide financial assistance to our church is through the PAR system.

PAR means Pre Authorized Remittance

When you enroll in PAR, your bank will automatically transfer your pledged amount once a month. You may already have automatic debits from your account so this would be nothing new for you.

There are many advantages to PAR:

- ~ PAR is convenient. There is no cheque writing and less work filling out donation envelopes.
- ~ You are able to support your Congregation even when you are away.
- ~ You may change the amount of your contribution at any time with 15 days notice.

PAR authorization forms are available in the Narthex or fill out the Pledge Form below and give it to Cheryl Holliday or Alan McKenzie in a sealed envelope marked Pledge Form. No matter which method of donating you choose, you will receive a tax receipt.



BUILDING RENOVATION COMMITTEE



It's finally happening! We received our Building permit for the renovation of our Church Home at the end of July and Kembic Construction moved in to start renovations August 1st. Our general contractor, Kembic Construction, estimates that the work they have to do will be completed sometime in June 2013. Watch the bulletin board in the hall of Northminster for photos of the work in progress.

Members of the Renovation Committee researched church organs and sound systems over the summer and are about to place orders for these important items. Plans are in the works for a new kitchen which will be located on the 2nd floor.

We started the process of identifying who will operate the daycare in the basement. We visited Arpi Nursery School in their new location in Downsview and let them know that they will be given the opportunity to match the best offer we receive for the daycare space. Redeemer Baptist Congregation expressed their wish to return to our building as a second congregation so we will be discussing that possibility with them.

Our biggest challenge now is finding the money to complete the renovations. Our committee is doing everything they can to keep costs under control without compromising the quality of the renovations. We met with Councillor Colle to ask for financial assistance and discussions are ongoing. We are grateful to the Federal Government who through Human Resources Development Corporation provided us with \$50,000.00 to help make the renovated building more accessible to those with mobility difficulties (see page 8). Fund raising events for the building renovation project are in the works. Please participate and give generously to the renovation project.

Our committee has undergone another name change. Years ago we started out calling ourselves the "Long Range Planning Committee". Once plans were established, we changed our name to the "Implementation Committee" because that best described that phase of the project but people outside the Congregation were not sure what was being implemented. We are now calling ourselves the "Building Renovation Committee" which everyone can understand. The committee name may change but it is still the same group of dedicated individuals who are determined that Asbury and West United Church will have a bright future in our newly renovated Church Home.



It has been over a year since we vacated our church building for renovations. We frequently hear, "when will work commence, or will we ever get back to our building?" However, after all the obstacles satan threw in our path we can take a deep breath and shout "Hallelujah, Hallelujah". The Building Permit was received on July 29, 2012 and work is now in progress.

On August 12th, members of the committee approved listing and conditions of Agreement in respect to leasing the church basement to a daycare operator. Many thanks to committee member Alan McKenzie for his tireless efforts to secure the most suitable Real Estate Broker, Collette Skelly, of ReMax Hallmark Realty. The listing was signed by the chair, and issued for August 27th.

September 25th was set for the bids to be in and opened. Our present operator, Apri Nursery School, will be given the "Right of first Refusal" as we want to have the highest bid for the space. This is critical as we have over-run our renovation budget due to the many delays.

We also want to say a big "thank you" to Pauline McKenzie who was instrumental in looking to various government departments where grants were available to help with our renovation. So far we have received \$50,000 from the Human Resource Skill and Development. (see page 8 for feature article)

There is a great deal of work to be done, but the task is not beyond us and on the eve of this Thanksgiving as we sing "Come, You Thankful People, Come". We appreciate all those who journey with us and continue to have faith in the project.

United Church 41st General Council in Ottawa August 11-18, 2012

Rev. Irene Ty attended the General Council meeting and highlighted the event during her sermon on Sunday Sept 23, 2012. Following is an edited excerpt from her sermon:

"I was honoured to be one of the commissioners at this year's General council which was held in Ottawa. It was my first time at a General Council. I was awed by the sheer size of it. Over 350 commissioners, in one big gymnasium, plus over 300 people who represented staff of general council, reporters, visitors and volunteers who helped to make this event happen. Six days of meetings, with one day in the middle of the week to take an excursion of our choice. I joined a busload of people to go on a hike in the Gatineau Hills and lunch at a local United Church in Quebec.

The over arching theme of General Council, was "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God", based on Micah 6:8. Former moderator Mardi Tindal in her opening address called for unity in the context of an action-oriented and intercultural church. She spoke about the humility required as our church moves into the future. She reminded us of the importance of listening to those who are vulnerable, including the young people. She spoke about the pain suffered by those who attended the Indian Residential School system. I quote: "When we have the courage to share in the sorrow of Aboriginal People, we allow the community to practice compassion".

An inspiring worship service began each of our days. The singing of a blend of traditional hymns and more contemporary music was led by a local church band. However, at the opening and closing worship, a 65 member mass choir from Ottawa-area United Churches came to add to the sound and rhythm of the gathering. On the last day, at the closing worship, youth led us in a spontaneous line dance that allowed us to move through the whole worship space.

There was also spontaneous singing. This came at a difficult time during the discussion on the Israel/Palestine report. People in one part of the room started singing "Lord, listen to your children praying". {Voices United #400} The singing and humming of this piece was soothing. It helped to calm us, so we could pause and take a deep breath, and the singing helped to invite the Spirit to guide and lead us.

There was time to share in table groups. There were 8 people at my table. We came from different parts of Canada, and one person was from Cuba, Miguel Castor from the Emmanuel Baptist church in Cuba, a partner of UCC. Our table also had a "young" man, who was under 25. The person that had the biggest impact on me was Marlene, an aboriginal person from Manitoba. She was always very honest, and what she shared always came from her heart, from deep inside her. She brought a perspective that was different from the others, a perspective that included her Indigenous community and a concern for the earth.

A momentous event took place at General Council. This was the signing of a covenant with our First Nations brothers and sisters that is to be read alongside the Basis of Union, a recognition and an honouring of their presence at the very beginning of the United Church, way back in 1925. As a symbolic statement of that truth, our Church crest was changed to include the four traditional colours and the phrase in Mohawk "akwe nia Tetewa:neren", which means "All my relations".

Many proposals come before the General Council. Proposals come locally, from congregations, from presbyteries, and from conference. There are always to many for the plenary alone to handle, so we were divided into 3 groups called commissions. Each commission was assigned proposals to deliberate and decide whether or not to accept. It was exciting for me to see what can happen to proposals, started by one person or a small group at a local congregation, then gain momentum and going through the different courts of the church, and then finally to General Council for deliberation and action. This gives me a lot of hope indeed!"


COPPER KETTLE




